


- Data gathering, analysis and visualisation

1. Profile of the community in London


- Demographic data
- Work and economic activity
- Inequality (health, education etc)
- Accommodation need and housing provision






2. Service directory

- Targeted and mainstream services accessed by Gypsies and Travellers
- Collaborative mapping with community members, local authorities and service providers
- Identify experiences and unmet needs



3. Gypsy and Traveller Services Borough Index

- Quality and inclusiveness of services in each Borough
- Measure how local authorities score against these criteria
- Resource for local campaigns



4. Gypsy and Traveller heritage

- Participatory mapping with Gypsies and Travellers to reveal history and heritage
- Traditional stopping places, lost caravan sites, places of community value
- Photos, recordings, memories and stories



Timeline

- Phase 1: Demographic data, data on exclusion and inequality, and data on housing, planning and regeneration – complete October 2017
- Phase 2: Gypsy and Traveller Services Index (accompanied by directory of services for use by the Traveller community) – complete April 2018
- Phase 3: Gypsy and Traveller heritage complete October 2018
