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A message from the Chair

LONDON GYPSIES & TRAVELLERS

Sarah Taylor, Chair of the Board of Trustees, reflects on LGT's achievements over the past year.

The second year of the pandemic brought new and deepened stresses and strains for Gypsies and Travellers. They rose to the challenge. Our work to support and empower has continued undaunted by successive waves of coronavirus and in the face of continuing prejudice and discrimination. Gypsies and Travellers have been resilient and united in fighting challenges, ranging from negative media portrayals and oppressive central government legislation to everyday instances of prejudice locally.

We have provided a positive alternative message, sharing the community's identity and culture with pride and confidence. We educated service providers and decision makers on the issues affecting Gypsies and Travellers, and the need to improve access to services and opportunities such as education and training.

LGT helped members of the community make their voices heard amid the noise of an ongoing public health crisis,

advocating and providing practical support to many young people and families. We worked with our supportive funders, committed trustees and dedicated and skilled staff team to achieve more than ever before under the most difficult of circumstances.

> Having pulled together and shown what we can achieve in troubled times, we look with hope to the future. This is my final message as Chair as I will shortly be stepping down from the role, but I am confident that London Gypsies and Travellers will rise to the challenges of 2022 and beyond.

Positive relationships... good communication

Over the past year London Gypsies and Travellers has reviewed its strategic priorities, outcomes and objectives. This process centred on a theory of change, also developed during 2020/21. examples of our work and the impact it has had. This is not comprehensive, but shows a sample of our activity and the way our theory of change is being put into action.

Our theory of change demonstrates how we aspire to make a difference for the Gypsy and Traveller community at a strategic level and in developing our organisation.

It revolves around three main outcomes that we wish to achieve:

- Change for the Gypsy and Traveller community
- Strategic change and influence
- Change for our organisation

These outcomes are pivotal to all our work. Therefore in this annual report we are organising our activity in the past year under these three headings. For each we provide

PART 1 Change for the Gypsy and Traveller community

We seek for the Gypsy and Traveller community to be informed and empowered to act, to have influence, voice and an improved quality of life.

Here we focus on examples of activities which demonstrate some of these aspirations.





"Since being away at university, I've had with a bit of an identity crisis related to my Traveller background. Improved living conditions

Accommodation advice and advocacy

Lack of suitable accommodation is one of the most urgent challenges for the community. Through our accommodation advice and advocacy work, we aim to increase the social inclusion of Irish Travellers, Romany Gypsies and Roma families living in houses, on sites and roadside camps in London.

We provide weekly advice and advocacy for families from London boroughs, enabling them to navigate the housing system more effectively, increasing their capacity to maintain their tenancy and avoid further housing crisis. We support families to access culturally suitable accommodation where possible.

Our accommodation advice team takes a preventive approach, building knowledge and skills within the Gypsy and Traveller community so that they can gain confidence and manage their own affairs effectively.



"What can be done for Travellers like myself stuck in temporary accommodation who want to live our nomadic way of life?" Daniel

Improving living conditions

Pauline was living with her family in a rat-infested first floor flat. Access was by stairs, and it was difficult for her wheelchair-using son to get in and out. She approached the LGT Accommodation Advice Service, which intervened with the council. The council was eventually persuaded to move the family into more suitable accommodation.

"We are in a three-bed house now with ground floor access for the wheelchair, and I am so grateful for your help with the council," says Pauline.

Access to rights and services

The Phoenix Arise Programme

The Phoenix Arise Programme supports Gypsies and Travellers who are, or have been, victims of domestic abuse. It has been tailored for Gypsy and Traveller women and men, in partnership with Solace Women's Aid.

We believe that, with the right kind of support and information, men and women can move towards a deeper understanding of abuse, its impact on children, how to prevent it and heal from it.



We run a six-week block of workshop sessions at the community centre at which LGT is based or external venues. We invite people to be themselves and to be forthcoming in asking questions.



The setting for all sessions is supportive, non-judgemental and informal. When in-person sessions have not been possible due to COVID 19, we have provided weekly support through phone calls.

> "Two year ago my kids went into care. I was in an extremely bad place and suffered so badly. I had lost my confidence and thought that I would never recover. Opportunities in education and training

The Bright Futures programme

The Bright Futures programme aims to increase opportunities for young Gypsies and Travellers aged 8-21, helping them gain the skills, knowledge and confidence to make informed choices for their future.

We address extreme disadvantage, increase opportunities and foster talent by supporting access to education, training and employment. We provide group work and

one-to-one support, alongside outreach to families living on caravan sites, in housing and roadside camps.

Our work focuses on:

- Improving employability
- Increasing skills and confidence
- Advocating in education
- Political education and activism

Activism and participation in decision making

Community development work

We support Gypsies and Travellers across London to influence the decisions that affect their lives.

Activities in 2021 have included:

- Working with residents to secure new sites and improvements to existing sites
- Organising London Gypsy and Traveller Forum meetings, focused on the 2021 elections for Mayor and London Assembly members
- Supporting community-led campaigns in response to significant policy issues
- Collaborating with the Greater London Authority and Gypsy and Traveller organisations to host Gypsy, Roma and Traveller History Month events

London Assembly letter campaign

Following the May 2021 elections for Mayor and London Assembly, LGT started a letter campaign, engaging community members and allies to email all 25 London Assembly members asking them to support the London Gypsy and Traveller Forum Manifesto. As a result, members across all political parties have asked questions about site provision, negotiated stopping, hate crime and mental health at Mayor's Question Time.

Pride and confidence in identity

History month event

This was the fourth year that LGT organised a Gypsy, Roma Traveller History Month event along with the Roma Support Group, ACERT, Traveller Movement and Southwark Travellers Action Group, with support from the Mayor of London. Mena Mongan of LGT and Ollie Malik, a young Roma man, cohosted the event.

Traveller histories exhibition

In July, with Southwark Travellers Action Group and Peabody, LGT organised an exhibition showcasing our Mapping the histories of London's Travellers' project in Southwark. The exhibition focuses on life in London between the 19th and mid-20th Century, using a selection of archival photos, newspaper cuttings and audio recordings of Romany and Irish Travellers sharing knowledge and memories.

PART 2 Strategic change and influence

We seek an increased influence on policy and legislation affecting accommodation and equality.

We also seek more inclusive services for Gypsies and Travellers in areas of accommodation, social services, education and better understanding of issues affecting Gypsies and Travellers by service providers and decision makers.



"Travellers are an ethnic minority. Our way of life goes back hundreds of years, not days. We don't want to trespass but there is nowhere to go. Councils are letting us down, they're not providing the sites and stopping places to accommodate our culture. We want to live alongside other communities and contribute to the areas where we stop."

Influence on policy and legislation

Policy work in London

We aim to hold politicians and decision makers accountable for policies and legislation that have a discriminatory impact on Gypsies and Travellers in London. We work in partnership to develop more inclusive policies that respond to the needs of the communities, with a focus on accommodation and equalities.

During 2021, at a local level, we:

- monitored how local authorities meet planning requirements to address the accommodation needs of Gypsies and Travellers
- provided feedback on site management and housing policies
- supported good practice on negotiated stopping as an alternative to eviction

Across London, we:

• provided briefings for the London Gypsy and Traveller Forum, and Greater London Assembly members and officers worked with GLA officers to progress negotiated stopping protocols on GLA land and Londonwide Gypsy and Traveller accommodation needs assessment



"I support the negotiated stopping approach, not only because it is a humane response to settlements, but also given the positive housing and health outcomes it can yield for Gypsy and Traveller communities. The report from London Gypsies and Travellers strongly makes this point and recommends a negotiated stopping

National policy and legal work

During 2021, at a national level, we:

- worked with other organisations across the country to support parliamentary opposition to the Police, Crime, Sentencing and Courts Bill
- intervened in two legal challenges: one against wide injunctions against persons unknown and the other against the planning definition of "Travellers".

"We are proud to be involved in this hugely important legal scrutiny of the catch-all injunctions which have effectively banned Gypsies and Travellers from stopping in large areas of the country... The judgment reinforces the fact that Gypsies and Travellers have the right to a nomadic way of life and we continue to push for alternatives to evictions and injunctions."

Drive to Survive demonstration

Working alongside community members and other organisations, LGT supported the Drive to Survive demonstration in London in July, protesting at the Police, Crime, Sentencing and Courts Bill and the threat it poses to the Traveller way of life.

Bringing better understanding of the issues affecting Gypsies and Travellers

Communications and media work

This work aims to challenge the negative public and political perceptions about Gypsies and Travellers and change current distorted narratives. We also aim to inform Gypsies and Travellers about our activities and the laws and policies that affect their lives. "The Media that Moves project is one of the best things we have been involved in. It gives us the strength to go forward on the right road to tackle the negative news that journalists publish about us every day."

Current activity includes:

- Our Media that Moves project, run in collaboration with Leeds GATE and the Public Interest Research Centre, which is researching the root causes of negative media representations of Gypsies and Travellers and concluding on strategies to bring change
- A collaboration with the organisation On Our Radar to support Gypsies and Travellers in making a short film challenging politicians' perceptions about nomadism and the accommodation issues affecting the community



PART 3 Change for our organisation

We seek for the Gypsy and Travellers to be at the heart of LGT's leadership, by taking on key roles both on the Board of Trustees and in the staff team. We aim to use evidence and learning to increase the impact of our work and expertise.

Using evidence and learning to increase impact

LGT work on Theory of Change

During 2021, our work developing a theory of change and a strategic plan to 2024 centred on the process of defining our outcomes, a programme of activities based around them and key indicators to measure impact and change.



London Gypsies and Travellers is determined to gather and use strong evidence to form both the basis of what we do, and to define key messages and recommendations for action to improve the lives of Gypsy and Traveller families.

Understanding negative stereotyping

The Media that Moves initiative aims to gain a deep understanding of the systems that perpetuate negative stereotyping of Gypsies and Travellers, analysing key influences on the media, the stories they produce and the "frames" of Gypsies and Travellers that emerge.

The study, conducted for LGT and Leeds Gate by the Public Interest Research Centre (PIRC), is drawing from more than 30 interviews with Gypsy and Traveller representatives, journalists, editors, and academics, and an analysis of existing research and resources. Using this knowledge, and through a series of workshops within the community, PIRC is examining how current patterns of thought and influence can be broken.
